

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MATHEMATICS FACULTY NEWS

We would like to begin by congratulating all pupils for the hard work they have put in throughout the academic year. I would also like to thank the parents/guardians for their unwavering support.

Year 11 and Year 13

We congratulate our Year 11 and Year 13 students on completing their final Maths exams. We wish them every success in their future endeavours and look forward to welcoming most of our Year 11 students back to our sixth form in September.

UKMT Junior Maths Challenge

A total of 40 students took part in the competition. Across both year groups, 4 students received Gold awards, 14 received Silver and 14 received Bronze. In Year 8, **Abdul Wajid (8K)** was awarded Gold and then Silver in the second round, earning the Best in School title. **Qazi Ehsan (8Q)** also received Gold and Silver in the second round. In Year 7, **Zayaan Tawhid Choudhury(7K)** achieved a Gold award and earned a Silver in the second round, receiving the title of Best in Year. These students stood out for their exceptional achievements at both the year and school level.



Year 12 Maths students enjoyed an unforgettable rewards trip to Southend Adventure Island, made possible by the Jack Petchey Foundation. Blending thrills with learning, the day brought maths to life through real-world challenges—like using trigonometry to calculate rollercoaster heights, analysing ride statistics, exploring speed and acceleration through kinematics, and even applying probability in arcade games. The experience boosted confidence, teamwork and aspirations - thanks to the funding, every student was able to take part and feel inspired.



Years 7 to 10 and Year 12

Students in Years 7, 8, 9, 10 and Year 12 have now completed their AP3 exams. They are encouraged to reflect on their performance and make use of the feedback provided by their teachers to support their continued progress.

Microsoft Teams



ENGLISH LITERACY NEWS

Speaking and Listening

At Mulberry Stepney Green School, we believe that literacy is the key to success. Therefore, each term we focus on developing a different aspect of literacy across the school. This term, our focus is to develop oracy across the school, also known as speaking and listening. Through structured talk, group discussions, questions, collaborative work and evaluating diverse opinions, students are able to learn effective skills for speaking and listening. These skills include the ability to verbally communicate effectively, deliver a speech or information articulately, engage in conversations using Standard English and express ideas confidently. Fundamentally, these skills are important for both academic and professional success.

Reading at Home

Parental involvement with reading activities at home has significant positive influences not only on reading achievement, language comprehension and expressive language skills, but also on students' interest in reading, and attentiveness in the classroom.

Research shows that students who read books regularly perform better at school and make more academic progress across the curriculum.

How can parents encourage their child to read at home?

- Encourage your child to read a wide range of fiction and non-fiction books including articles. For example, novels, newspapers, biographies, autobiographies, and magazines.
- You may encourage them to read books focused on topics that they enjoy such as football, sports, science, mystery, adventure, and history.
- Talk about books. Engage your child in book discussions about their favourite characters and books. Share your favourite books with your child. This could inspire them to emulate your positive reading habits.
- Utilise electronic devices such as kindles and audiobooks to help your child access other useful online reading resources.
- You could also use subtitles/captions on the television to help your child develop their pronunciation of specific words.



Literacy Interventions

We provide valuable literacy interventions for specific groups of students in order to boost their attainment in English. These intervention sessions include Additional English lessons for years 7 and 8 students, as well as one-to-one English tuitions for year 7. I would like to thank all parents for supporting these important literacy interventions. Literacy is the key to Success.

- And dazzling in colourful flame tests


The smiles and “wow” moments said it all—everyone had an absolute blast!

A massive shoutout to our incredible Science Department, the passionate Year 5 students, and their dedicated teachers for making these days such a fantastic success!








GOOD NEWS - BRITISH SCIENCE WEEK




PE FACULTY NEWS







MFL - PARIS TRIP





Starting a secondary new school is an exciting, though often anxious time for both Year 6 pupils and their parents.




Visit to Barclays Head Office





